

## **Production - Exports + Δ Stock**


A new methodology has been adopted to address the omission, and now uses the following formula

## Production + Imports - Exports + Δ Stocks


New methodology increases the domestic consumption for a large number of producing countries

- Yellow bars refer the world coffee production in coffee year 2020/21
- Blue bars refer to the potential increase in world coffee production
- Red data refers average yield in 60-kg/ha

#### **FOUR SCENARIOS**

- Brazil There are 50 origins, with a combined 8.4 million hectares of area harvested, with yield below 34.5 bags/ha. Raising the yield to that of Brazil will bring about an additional 213 million bags of coffee per year.
- Honduras There are 44 origins, with a combined 8.0 million hectares of area harvested, with yield below 19.3 bags/ha. Raising the yield to that of Honduras will bring about an additional 86 million bags of coffee per year.
- India There are 38 origins, with a combined 8.0 million hectares
  of area harvested, with yield below 12.1 bags/ha. Raising the yield
  to that of India will bring about an additional 33 million bags of
  coffee per year.
- Vietnam There are 51 origins, with a combined 10.3 million hectares of area harvested, with yield below 44.2 bags/ha. Raising the yield to that of Vietnam will bring about an additional 314 million bags of coffee per year.



## The Center for circular economy in coffee

#### Proposal

The Center for circular economy in coffee is a precompetitive open-source platform for enhancing Circular Economy in the coffee sector. This Platform will be a hub managed by the Lavazza Foundation in Turin, Italy, and supported by ICO and ITC, with the ambition and objective to collect and share all good practices, solutions, studies and practical information about circular economy as applied to the coffee value chain, from the coffee farming to the consumption and end of life.

The main focus will be on gathering together the know-how related to the Circular Economy in the coffee sector and make it available to companies, associations, universities, and government bodies in order to improve the economic and environmental performances of the producers and to connect experts by contributing to the circular economy acceleration in the coffee sector.



#### THE INTERNATIONAL COFFEE ORGANIZATION 1963-2023: 60 years of ICO development projects to build a sustainable coffee industry

Sixty years ago, the International Coffee Organization (ICO) was established following the conclusion of the first International Coffee Agreement 1962 under the auspices of the United Nations. Since its inception, the ICO has been consistently engaged in assisting its Members with the development, fund mobilization, implementation, monitoring and evaluation of coffee sector development projects aiming to promote sustainable growth for the benefit of all stakeholders, from coffee farmers to consumers.

All ICO projects implemented from 1963 to 2023 totalled US\$319 million<sup>1</sup>, enabling the Organization to assist and finance project activities in Member countries. 




